Pastor's Perspective — Fidelity to God and His Word

Sometimes Christians are not very kind in the things that they say to each other and are harsh in expressing their opinions. This is especially true when we treat our closely held preferences in areas of freedom as tests of orthodoxy.

I recall listening some years ago to a fellow believer describe their heartache over things that were said at their church about them and their family because they did not home-school their children, but allowed them to go to public school. The opinions were so strongly held and unpleasantly expressed that they left that church where for all intents and purposes, there was only one right way to educate one's children and that way was not in the public school. Parents who chose otherwise were treated as second-class, even as bad parents, though there is nothing in the Bible that would support that view. It's simply a matter of personal preference.

I was recently reminded of that incident while being told that I do not preach the Bible, that indeed I change it, that our preaching and singing at Fellowship is man-centered and that I need to repent of my errant ways. The person who said this has a particularly strong allegiance to an English version of the Bible that I respect and hold in high regard but do not happen to preach from. They noted that from time to time, I will comment on the reading of a particular passage and suggest a different one. That, in their estimate, owing to their allegiance to that one particular English Bible, is evidence that I am seeking to change the Bible. But nothing could be further from the truth.

When I comment on the reading of a particular text and suggest the best English Bible translation of that text, or offer one of my own, it's not to change the Bible, but to bring out with the greatest possible clarity and precision what I understand to be the reading of that text in the original language. At the end of the day, I'm not interested in any particular English version (though I'll happily tell you which I think to be the best and why). I'm interested in the reading of the Hebrew and the Greek texts—the languages into which God gave the sixty-six books of the Bible and from which we are able to demonstrate with confidence that God has indeed preserved His inspired Word.

When we select music at Fellowship—whether it's played or sung and whether it's congregational or otherwise—we give primary attention to the doctrine it teaches and thus to its fidelity to the Bible itself. We measure the songs we sing by their message, not their date of publication or whether they're found in a hymnal. This means that on any given Sunday and in any service we are just as apt to sing from the hymnal as not and just as apt to sing something old as something new. It also means that no matter what the choice of songs might be (and whether we prefer them as much as others), all of the songs will be true to what the Bible teaches and therefore edifying to the saints and honoring to God.

As Christians we will not all agree on matters that the Bible leaves to personal preference—and that's okay because we can still walk together in perfect oneness, striving together for the faith of the gospel, as long as we don't make our preferences the standards everyone else must embrace or else fall beneath the anvil of our judgment. When that happens everyone loses.

The first national garden was created in 1820, and after moving several times, it moved to its present location in 1933. It hosts a variety of plants from different regions of the country, from cacti to orchids.

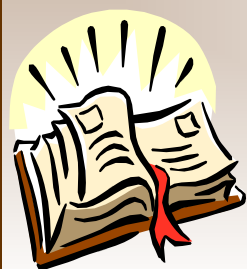
