



Pastor's Perspective – Let Your Expectations Soar

"And what do you want for Christmas?" From our earliest days we are trained to have high expectations at this time of year. Unfortunately, the holidays seldom deliver all the happiness and love we've come to expect from them. Advertising images of romantic couples and laughing families may sell a lot of merchandise, but they often mock the heartache felt by so many people at this time of year—perhaps even some of you.



*Come, Thou long-expected Jesus,
Born to set Thy people free;
From our fears and sins release us;
Let us find our rest in Thee.
Israel's Strength and Consolation,
Hope of all the earth Thou art,
Dear Desire of every nation,
Joy of every longing heart.*

What should we do? Shove our expectations deep down like cold hands in a winter coat? Put our hopes on long-term layaway? Pretend we don't really care?

I have a suggestion. Instead of trying to temper our expectations, why not let them soar toward the highest desires kindled by this season? That hope is echoed in Charles Wesley's great hymn:

No holiday can deliver what we long for, but we can find it in Christ Himself. When Simeon saw Jesus, he praised God saying: "My eyes have seen Your salvation, which You have prepared in the sight of all people, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to Your people Israel (Luke 2:30-32).

This Christmas, watch your expectations, and see them wonderfully fulfilled in Jesus.

Ministry Uses the Holidays to Tell of Jesus

We started by introducing the food first: turkey, stuffing, potatoes and gravy, sweet potatoes, cranberry salad, rolls and the pies—pumpkin and apple. Then, while everyone tasted this very-American tradition, we showed slides of the first Thanksgiving Day and the Pilgrims. We talked about the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and football. Then, we re-introduced the One to whom we give thanks and His most precious gift to us: His Son Jesus Christ.

Thus, the English as a Second Language (ESL) classes held at Fellowship Baptist Church integrated the November holiday with the students attending the classes on Thursday nights. On November 17, and for the second year in a row, the ESL teachers had a "Mini-Thanksgiving" for their students. It is one of the ways Brian Platt and Mary Ann Monk try to incorporate the everyday life in the USA with the students that come from 19 different countries and five continents. There are more than 35 students who have enrolled to take the free classes at the church: four separate classes with students that span skills from knowing hardly any English to those who are accomplished in the language but want to improve their writing or speaking skills.

This is the eighth year of the ministry, with the goal of not only helping the students with their English, but introducing them to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The classes are structured with a basic ESL course for the first half of the evening. A break then occurs with light refreshments and a chance for students to have conversations with one another and church volunteers. The second half of the evening involves a continuation of learning English, but with the Bible as the textbook. The classes start with Genesis and the Creation and God's authority, the year progresses with the message of the Bible, culminating with the sacrificial death, burial and resurrection of Jesus and then the establishment of the church.

Students are also invited to attend a special Sunday School class on Sunday mornings with Brian and to stay for the worship service. Some students have been coming faithfully to that morning service, with one student coming since the first year ESL classes began. "I keep thinking, with Pastor's messages, that this is the week they will walk up during the invitation," Mary Ann said. Certainly, the Gospel has been presented to those attending this ministry many times.

Not only do the students have the opportunity to attend Sunday services, but the volunteers at ESL make efforts to connect and meet needs of students throughout the year. Several times people have volunteered to help work on resumes for the students or help them prepare for their citizenship tests. Driving lessons, tours of the area, game nights, baby showers, signing up for aid and even helping one student while she went to the hospital in labor have been opportunities of love the church members have had to communicate God's love to the ESL students.

During December, the class teachers will continue to teach students about American holidays, with a Christmas party on the 15th. The whole church is invited to come and minister to the students. And please remember to pray that the event will give us the opportunity to really connect with the students, to build friendships and, best of all, to use the work for His glory and for many to trust Him as their Savior.


