



Pastor's Perspective — The "Alternative Lifestyle" of David Wise

In the recently concluded Winter Olympics, David Wise won the gold medal for the United States in the first ever half-pipe skiing contest in Olympic history. But in the days since, he's been making headlines for a different reason—what NBC reporter Skyler Wilder termed his "alternative lifestyle" (<http://www.nbcolympics.com/wdtn/news/david-wises-alternative-lifestyle-leads-olympic-gold>)

When I first heard that ascription, I thought: "Here we go again." But after I read Wilder's article and did some digging, I had a different take on things.

In the same way, let your
light shine before men...
Matthew 5:16

At the age of 23, David has a wife, is monogamous, has a 2-year-old daughter, is openly Christian, attends church regularly and one day wants to be a pastor—and in the world of freestyle skiing that pretty much makes him a freak. In that world, they want their stars to conform to a pattern that dovetails with that culture. They want loud. They want crazy. They want people

who are sold out to the late-night party scene. In short, they want pretty much everything that Wise isn't, but because he's so good at what he does and so credible in the difference he presents, they can't ignore him—and David knows that. Indeed, he freely admits to being counterculture. Yet it's not his desire in being that way to draw attention to himself, but rather to direct attention to the One who has made him different; namely, the Lord Jesus Christ.

I have been refreshed in learning about David's "alternative lifestyle."

I have also been reminded that in that lifestyle David is being for Christ

in his world, what each of us have been called to be for Him in ours, which is salt and light (difference-makers) through whom the gospel is seen and heard and savingly known.

My prayer is that our lives would be so lived before a watching world.

A Different Perspective on Our Ministry to the Philippines

Pastor and Neita Lindholm had the opportunity to minister last month at the Word of Life Bible Institute and the Mountain View Christian Bible Church, in the Philippines. While it was Pastor's sixth time to go since 2009, it was Neita's first, encouraged to do so with a love offering from the church. As in the past, Pastor taught classes at the institute and spent time counseling the students in both informal and formal settings. He is repeatedly asked to preach at Mountain View, which he also did, but this time his wife accompanied him and sang at the services. Pastor's next trip is scheduled for the 2015/16 academic year.

Facets editors thought it would be interesting to get Neita's perspective on the ministry. Thank you, Neita, for your input—even amid the physical adjustments of jet lag.

Have you ever been to the Philippines before?

No, this was my first time and I'm grateful to have had the opportunity to be a part of Ron's teaching ministry. Thank you for making it possible for me to go!

Have you gone on a ministry trip like this before?

Similar mission trips include Germany, Brazil, Alaska and one last year to an unnamed site in Southeast Asia.

What ministry did you do together?

In preparation before the trip we updated Ron's notes for copying and binding and I also helped in copying collateral reading materials; while there, I helped with collecting student assignment data for grading

purposes and placing that information in the students' mailboxes; when Ron spoke in Sunday services or chapel, I shared in song; and on Valentine's Day evening, we were asked to speak at the "Hearts Day" celebration giving our testimony of how God brought us together as a couple and then how He leads us together in ministry.

What did you do alone?

I was asked to share with the female students on a couple of evenings for devotions; during the day, I helped organize Sunday School materials which involved making packets for some community churches nearby and other places like Tacloban (recently devastated area hit by storm surge from Typhoon Yolanda); and upon request, counseled a few of the female students.

What was your impression of Word of Life?

I was impressed with several things: the family-like atmosphere; genuine care and concern for each other was seen throughout the two weeks as we watched students actively praying for one another; the attitude while there was one of praising the Lord whether in class, work time, free time, PE, studying or in singing. It was amazing—it was with all their heart. In talking with several of the staff, I was impressed with how they came to Christ through the summer camps at Word of Life as young people and now, some just in their early 20's, are serving/training to be leaders at Word of Life sharing Christ with the next generation.

What did you expect and what surprises did you have?


